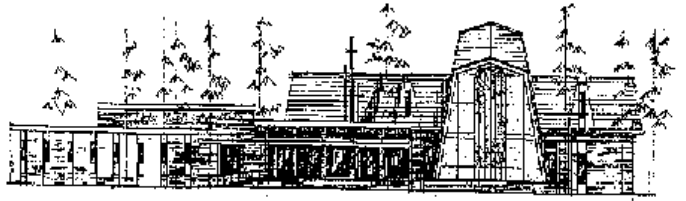

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I pray that you are keeping a holy Lent, a time of baptismal renewal and penitence. What does that mean? I pray that you are reading Matthew's gospel daily, asking questions about the meaning of its text for you, and praying daily for the Holy Spirit's guidance and help in applying the text to your life, including the renunciation of all that is hostile to God and the amending of life. I hope that your gratitude for God's mercy and goodness is leading you to respond with a growing generosity towards the world's hungry. Just as each of us hungers and thirsts for God, so we become more aware of those whose physical hunger and thirst stands as a barricade in their lives.

I also pray that you are finding yourself increasingly drawn to the services of God's house – not only on the weekend (including the study of Matthew and Evening Prayer on Mondays from 6-7 p.m.) but also for midweek worship. Ellen Bethune staffs the nursery each Wednesday night, so it is possible to bring your household to the soup supper between 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. (freewill offering) and then stay for Evening Prayer from 7-7:30 p.m. If you are one not to get out in the evenings, please don't forget the noonday Eucharist from 12 to 12:35 p.m. on Wednesdays. Our midweek theme is the Matthew 6 version of the Lord's Prayer and Martin Luther's Small Catechism explanation of the model prayer.

We remember where this Lenten journey is leading, don't we? In the western Church, we observe the Feast of the Resurrection of our Lord on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox. This year Easter Sunday is on March 23, about the earliest it can be. That means Holy Week begins on the weekend of March 15-16 with Palm Sunday; we will receive new members into our fellowship on that weekend. Again this year we have daily services at noon Monday through Friday, at 6 p.m. on Monday, then for the Triduum at 7 p.m. on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, and at 6 p.m. on Saturday (the Easter Vigil). Our Easter celebration continues at 6:30 a.m. for the Sunrise Eucharist in the courtyard and festival celebrations at 8:30 and 11 a.m. The German Easter Eucharist is on Saturday, March 29, at 12 noon in the parish church.

For those with children desiring to claim their baptismal right to commune, we have first communion instruction on Sunday, March 9, following the late service. Parents and children will have pizza and a time of instruction. Then, take home materials will be distributed to allow parents and children to continue their discussion of importance of the great gift of the Lord Jesus' body and blood in the Holy Communion. This

year, our First Communion day will be on the Second Sunday of Easter, March 30.

If you are using the Lenten devotional reading guide "Following Jesus" for your reading of Matthew's gospel, you will notice that the Matthew is guiding us into a closer walk and a deeper relationship with the Lord Jesus, His Father, and the Holy Spirit. At no time are we allowed to think that this relationship is anything but a sheer gift of grace. At the same time, we find ourselves wanting to spend more time in prayerful communion with the triune God. The questions become more probing and challenging, the opportunity to respond with gratitude grows incrementally, a symbol of our own spiritual growth.

In chapter 16 of Matthew's Gospel, the Lord Jesus asks two questions: "Who do people say that I am?" and "Who do you say that I am?" In a sense, He is also asking us those questions this Lent. And Matthew's gospel is leading us daily to answer that second question not only with our lips but with our lives!

I am praying for you, and I hope you are praying for each other and for me this Lent. The Holy Spirit is around us, behind us, and in us, all the while working on us. At the same time, there are opposing forces trying to keep us in the same old place, locked in the same old patterns, and skipping just across the surface of God's great love for us.

If you haven't started in on the devotional guide, you can start right away. Ash Wednesday was February 6, so you can count forward from that day and catch up by reading what you have missed.

Our Roman Catholic friends have a very good tradition called "Coming Home," an opportunity for those that have been away to return to their spiritual home. If you have been away from the services of God's house for a while or even for years, I am inviting you to come home to St. Matthew's this Holy Week. Mark your calendar for March 15-16 and just jump back in. You won't have to jump through any hoops. You will simply be welcomed home without a lot of fuss or drama or hype.

Look for a giving opportunity to purchase the materials we need for some needed renovations like painting, new toilets, new chairs and tables for the educational wing, ceiling tiles, floor tiles and more! If there is enough interest we may do some renovations to the McCombs Fellowship Hall and kitchen. One of the "ideas" is to turn McCombs Hall into a multi-purpose audio-visual media room.

We want to **see everyone take some ownership in St. Matthew's** by coming out and supporting a project to do the work. For those that have skills to do the work, we want you. If you can't do the work you can support by being a helping hand, fixing food for the workers, cleaning up or setting up. It will be a church wide event and we want everyone to participate!

We are also working on updating or putting the correct policies and procedures in place concerning church funds, giving, property use, personnel, the church constitution, membership, budgeting and spending.

We have numerous *caring ministries* here at St. Matthews and they are very good. From personal crisis to prayer there are people who support these

ministries through their time and talents. You may not be aware of all the ministries we do have to take care of our church family. We are actively looking at the places we need to improve so people don't fall through the cracks. One way is to get people in touch with the right person or group. You have to help us with this. We will be making access to help easier in the coming months.

January 2008 Council Summary

- This business and visioning meeting of the Congregational Council was held on January 26, 2008 beginning with a devotional led by Pastor Sam at 11:30am at the conclusion of Council's annual retreat session. The meeting continued with Richard Chinn presiding.
 - Council accepted the receipt of standard reports, which generally include the minutes of the previous meeting, report of the senior pastor, report of the visitation pastor, treasurer's report, and the parish records report. Certain of these reports have been delayed but will be submitted at a later date by their writers.
 - Elmer Wild and Dale Blade were in attendance at this meeting on behalf of the Finance Ministry Team. The proposed Spending Plan (Budget) for the year 2008 was presented. After a period of deliberation, which focused on a provision for transfers of funds back to cash reserves and personnel costs a vote was called for. A motion was duly made and seconded. The spending plan was approved for submission to the Congregation by a vote of 10 to 1.
 - A list of nominees was presented for the Pastoral Support Team. They are Helen Stansbury, Jim Bauer, Linda Riesz, Chris Bocchino, Walter Brehm and Lisa Hornick. The nominees are to determine among themselves the distribution of terms, 2 for a three year term, 2 for a two year term and 2 for a one year term.
 - Discussion continued on a Contribution Policy document prepared by Jerry Bramley.
 - The assignment of Council Liaisons to the Ministry Teams has been deferred to the next meeting.
 - The meeting adjourned with the praying of the Lord's Prayer at 1:30 pm. The next meeting is scheduled Thursday February 14, 2008 beginning with devotions in the sanctuary at 7:00pm.
5. The Membership activity report for January 2008 was received.
 6. The treasurer reported income for January at \$48,830. Expenditures totaled \$48,193, leaving a positive result of \$637.
 7. A motion to accept these standard reports was approved by council.
 8. There were no reported executive committee actions.
 9. The contribution policy was discussed. A motion for acceptance with noted changes was made and approved by council. The policy is made a part of the minutes of the meeting.
 10. Discussion was held regarding council members accepting liaison positions with the ministry teams. The following council members agreed to act as liaison with these respective teams:

 - PERSONNEL- Mark Williams

 - FELLOWSHIP- Brigitte WaltersMinistry team liaisons not filled were Evangelism and Social.
11. A letter from the Parish Records Audit Team dated February 11, 2008, was received, recommending the removal of 49 adults and 31 children from the parish records. Letters had been submitted to all of the families listed, noting that they had not attended for a protracted period of time. A motion was made that the list be accepted with the exception of the names of Wendy, Jeffery, and Courtney Robinson. The motion was approved by council.
 12. There was discussion regarding the formulation of a team to study the church constitution. The team is to address leadership continuity/rotation problems, fix ambiguities, and address needs/efficiencies as noted by the past two presidents. A motion was made to accept the five recommended: John Antonelli, Bob Stansbury, Joel Melito, Pastor Sam, and Jerry Bramley. The motion carried by majority using a hand vote. It was agreed this matter would be placed on the agenda for additional discussion at the next meeting.
 13. There was discussion regarding various aspects of the Personnel Team. No action was taken.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10pm. Council session concluded with the Lord's Prayer.

Many of you have asked questions about the needlework on the Altar cushions. Hopefully all will enjoy this information below.

In 1984 a small group, inspired by Pastor McSwain, began planning needlepointed kneeling cushions for the altar area. The life, death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ as celebrated in the Lutheran Church year was chosen as the theme. The final cushion was to depict the spreading of the Gospel. Because the altar area had one center gate, the gate cushion was planned to represent one of the Sacraments in the Lutheran Church-Communion.

The Counting House at Pawley's Island consulted in the design and mechanics of this project. Cherry Horn began graphing the designs for the shields, and appropriate crosses for the themes chosen. Several men constructed tables for holding the canvases. Twenty-one dedicated church members needlepointed the first seven cushions, each one taking approximately 500 hours. Two corner cushions were necessary. The completed canvases were taken to Kerstin McDaniel in Asheville, North Carolina for construction. These cushions were then dedicated.

When our worship space was rearranged and enlarged, the new altar was considerably larger. Seven additional cushions were planned. Themes important in the Christian Church and the Lutheran Church were chosen for the two side cushions. The other Sacraments in the Lutheran Church-Baptism-was designed to go with the Communion cushion. Cherry Horn, whose job had taken her to Greenville, NC, continued the graphing of those designs. Ann Fitz-Simons, a local needlepoint designer, chose crosses for the corners; graphed and painted the designs on these four canvases. Encouraged and aided by Mary McSwain, a now bonded group of needlepointers completed the additional canvases in February 1996. They were immediately constructed by Kerstin McDaniel.

During the past twelve years twenty-eight devoted needlepointers have lovingly given over 8,000 hours to create these ecclesiastical designs which add meaning, beauty and warmth to our worship space. To them we give our sincere thanks. We praise God for their talent and diligent work. On June 9, 1996, the cushions were dedicated to the Glory of God.

EASTER IS EARLY THIS YEAR

Easter is always the 1st Sunday after the 1st full moon after the Spring Equinox (which is March 20). This dating of Easter is based on the lunar calendar that Hebrew people used to identify Passover, which is why it moves around on our Roman calendar. Based on the above, Easter can actually be one day earlier (March 22) but that is pretty rare.

Here's the interesting info. **This year is the earliest Easter any of us will ever see the rest of our lives!** And only the most elderly of our population have ever seen it this early (95 years old or above!). And none of us have ever, or will ever, see it a day earlier! Here are the facts:

- 1) The next time **Easter** will be this early (March 23) will be the year 2228 (220 years from now). The last time it was this early was 1913. (so if you're 95 or older, you are the only ones that were around for that!).
- 2) The next time it will be a day earlier, March 22, will be in the year 2285 (277 years from now). The last time it was on March 22 was 1818. So, no one alive today has or will ever see it any earlier than this year.

Contribution Policy

St. Matthew's Evangelical Lutheran Church is exempt from state and federal income tax as a not for profit religious organization. In order to meet its responsibilities to the Internal Revenue Code, church council has adopted a contribution policy. The policy defines the General Mission and Ministry Fund and explains how contributions can be made to the church. It also explains how designated funds are established. In the event that the purpose of the designated fund have been met, the policy explains how monies in excess of the initial need are handled. The contribution policy consists of five pages and comprehensively covers appropriate and inappropriate contributions. Copies of the policy will be continuously maintained in the commons of the church. All parishioners are urged to take a copy for their personal use.

FIFTH SUNDAY PROGRAM FOR 2008

Congratulations to the congregation on its contributions to the Fifth Sunday Program. This special giving opportunity has greatly reduced the church debt in an on going program that continues to reduce the mortgage on our church facility. The year 2008 will have four Sundays when we make it a point to call your attention to the success of the program and how you can be a part of it. Fifth Sundays for 2008 are: March 30, June 29, August 31, and November 30.

Our past efforts have been successful in reducing a \$730,000 mortgage in 2004 to one of \$310,000 at the end of January 2008. This leaves us with 45 monthly payments. BUT, let us reduce that also and carry on in 2008 with the Fifth Sunday program.

This is a "double win" situation. Not only do your contributions go directly to the principle but also they reduce future interest costs. This makes every contribution you make worth more than 100% to the program and shortens the time left to make the monthly payments.

You can contribute to this program by using the special envelopes provided, also envelopes found in the church pews. Contributions can be given through memorials.

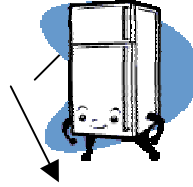
